



Miss. Margaret Schenk will be coming ove to go to to S.W. with us, and will be staying here till Christmas.




and Benjamin bought a bike, while Turraji has money towards one.

We know that it was only in answer to the prayers of God's people that we arrived home without accident, having had only 2 punctures and 2 blow-outs and very minor engine trouble.




