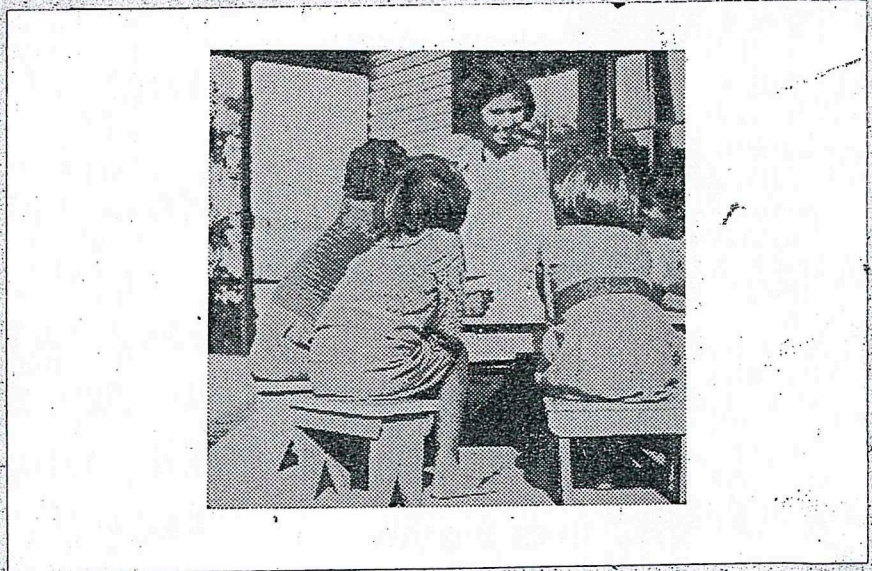

When on the tour in the East, the reception given to the Minstrels by the Lord Mayor of Melbourne was recorded by the A.B.C., and it was a great delight to hear these records, which were presented to us, as another item on the Concert programme.

Poor Father Christmas couldn't change his voice, so all the

people knew very well who he was (Don't tel the children but it was Mr. S. Barnes.)

We just wonder how a social could go off so well without Mr. and Mrs. Mick Taylor there to enter into all the games. We are sorry we did not send out any "News Notes" last month but just as we were "going to press" the rain came and there were no trains for three weeks, so we have carried our news over to this month.

Regarding the RAIN, we give thanks to God Almighty in supplying this thirsty land with the rain it needed. We had just over 3" here, and now all the hills are green with grass and all the children can talk about at the moment is "Gulgoola". We know that after rain like we have had, the bush people will be able to find more food in the bush and we also have more water now, so we say "Thank you" to our Heavenly Father for looking after us.

Just down at the end of the Mission, just opposite the Hospital, if you were to come home you would see things very busy - men shovelling and truckfuls of dirt being taken away, not to mention shots of dynamite now and again. We know that that means that our WATER SCHEME is progressing. There is already one big hole which will hold 40000 gallons when it is full of water and the men are busy on another which will hold 160000 gallons. The idea of this is to conserve some of the millions of gallons of water which rush down the creek and go to waste when we have a big downpour. Unfortunately, although the men had finished the first hole, there was no cement to complete it so we were a little late to catch this year's rain. Mr. Ranjie McIntyre is in charge of the works down there, while Mr. Snowy Barnes and Mr. Tom Murray are busy cementing all the house tanks which need fixing.

The Hill People write to you as follows:

During the school holidays, we went away with our parents for a short time to Menzies. While we were away, we were held up because of the flood and we didn't get home as we expected to. Mr. Barnes hired Mr. Lovick's car to get Mrs. Barnes and the family. I suppose Mr. Barnes thought Mrs. Barnes was washed away with the rest of the things at that time. However, we were all glad to see Mr. Lovick arrive at Menzies after three weeks absent from home. All the people at Menzies were very kind to the Mt. Margaret children and the children were pleased with their friendship and welcome and enjoyed it very much. One night we were asked to have a little concert, so all the people rolled up to Lawrence's Corner. We sang many hymns and Lois and Marjorie played the mandolin and the boys played the gumleaves. After our singing, the people enjoyed it so much that they thought they must give something, and they gave us £3. They said also that they wished they were at Mt. Margaret to hear more singing and music. Next morning the children all went down town and bought ice-creams, ice-blocks, spider drinks, chocolates and cool drinks. We praise the Lord for all His loving kindness to us and help in all our needs. Let us trust Him forever.

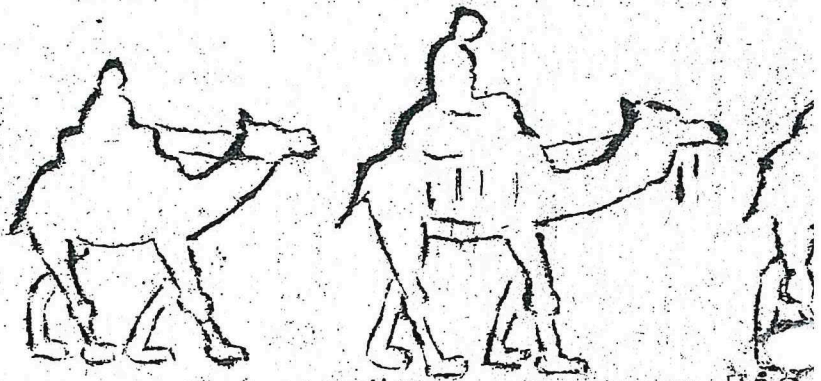

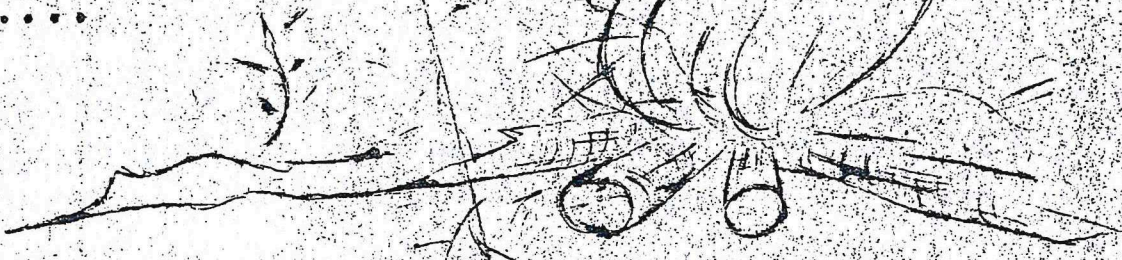

## OUR ANNIVERSARY WEEK-END

Mr. and Mrs. Sharpe arrived in their Gospel Van Saturday afternoon bringing the Leonora party. On Sunday MORNING all the children looked happy and smiling on the platform. The singing went off well under Mr. Lovick's baton. The Men's Bible Class, although depleted, sang "Jesus took my Burden" and added variety by having a mouthorgan duet from Reg and Arthur in the middle. The Primary sang "At the Heart's Door" with actions and Ruby and Lennie Gray showed the people a beautiful picture of Jesus knocking at our heart's door while the rest were singing. The Primary Teacher sang "Jesus, Wonderful Lord". Mr. Sharpe gave the children a flannelgraph talk on the verse - "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up". He told the story of Moses and the Children of Israel in the wilderness with pictures on the flannelgraph. One moment the children saw manna on the ground and the next minute there were big green snakes wriggling around the people then they saw Moses pointing to the brazen serpent and saw how some people obeyed and looked and others wouldn't and so they were not healed. Then the children saw a red Cross above the brazen serpent and Mr. Sharpe told us how that we must look to Calvary to have our sins put away. If we obey and look to Jesus our hearts will be washed white in the Blood of the Lamb (This story is in Ex. -- look it up and read it).

In the AFTERNOON Mr. Sharpe drove the Gospel Van into the middle of the Mission and put records of favourite hymns over the loudspeaker outfit so that everyone from the Hill to the Homes could hear. We also heard the recording of the wongudda choruses, corroborees, and reception given by the Lord Mayor of Melbourne to the Minstrels. Everyone was thrilled to hear them so clearly.

In the EVENING, there was a very full programme. Besides the items from the main S. choir, the men rendered another number "The world is not my Home" and this time they introduced with their piece an impromptu band - Benjamin on the banjolin, Charlie on the accordian, Teddy on the mouthorgan, Reg on the tonette and Arthur on the gumleaf. The main Band played both morning and evening and the visitors greatly enjoyed all the items from the band. The Primary Teachers sang "Love Divine" and the Intermediate girls sang "Sing of a perfect Salvation". The Primary sang "I'll do my best for Jesus" and Mássie and Ruby Grey sang a duet in one verse. 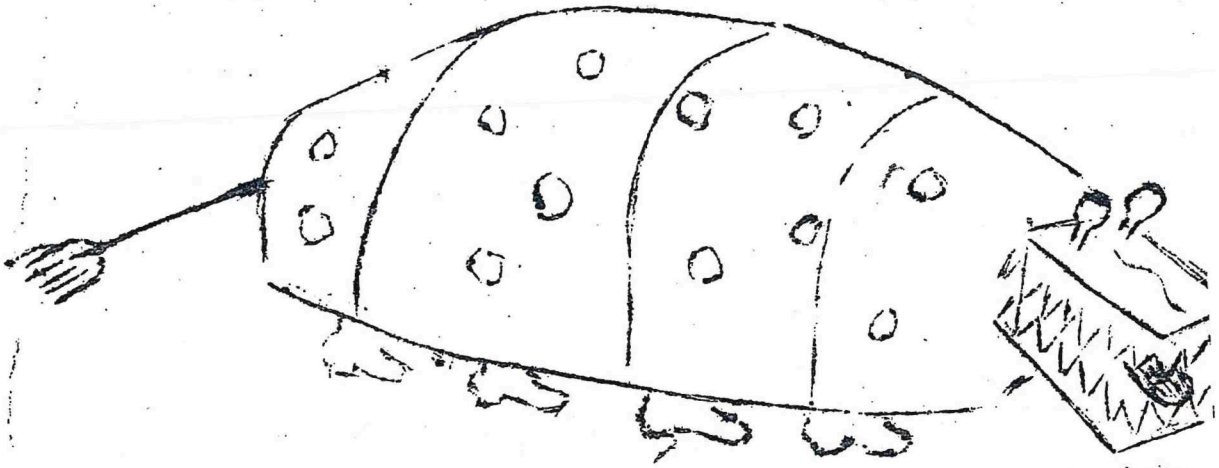

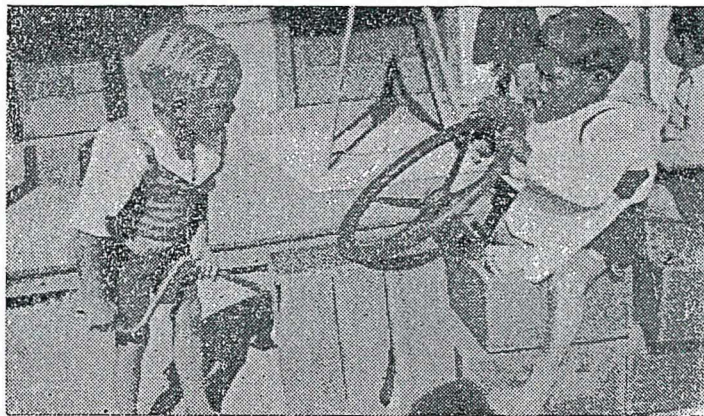

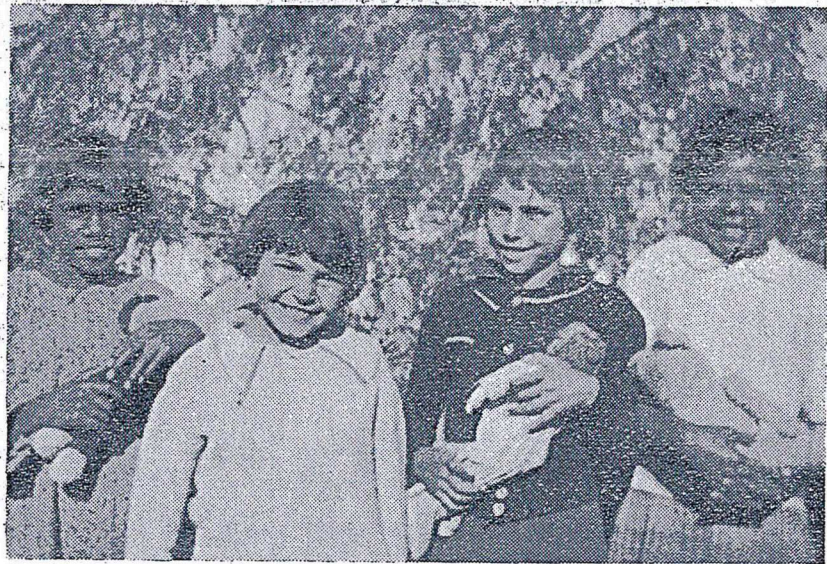
