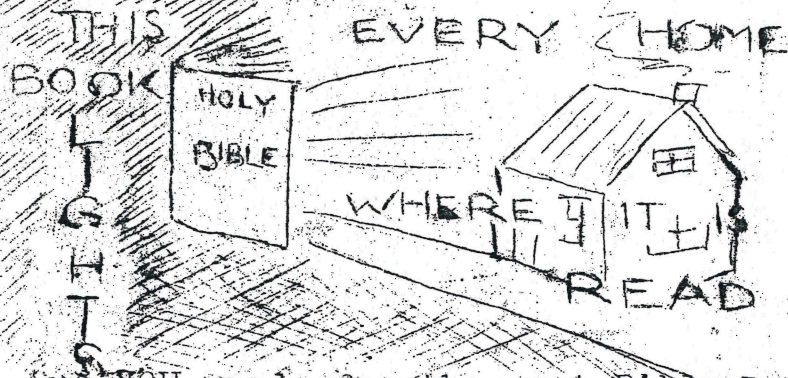

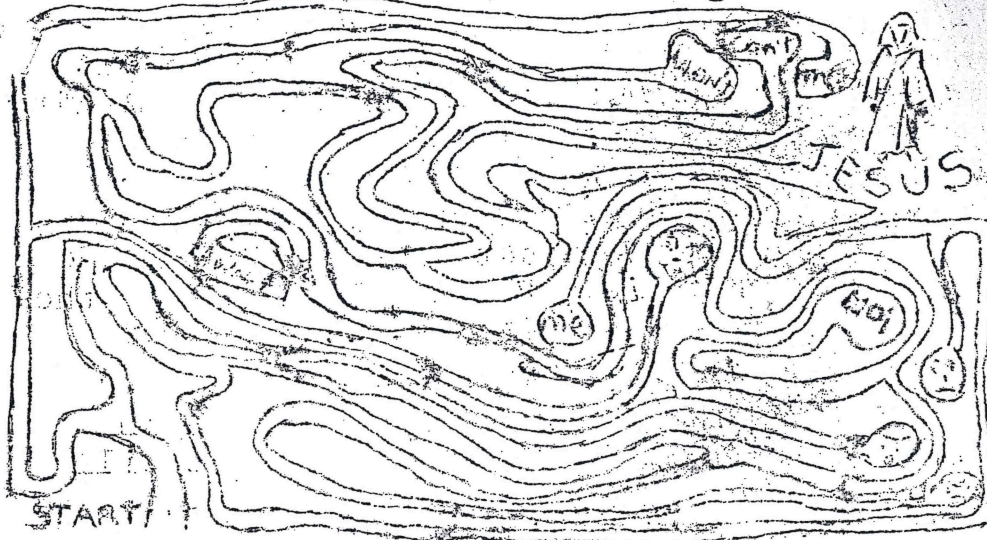
### What Happened.

Mr. Drew's messages in the morning and evening were simple and direct, and challenged us

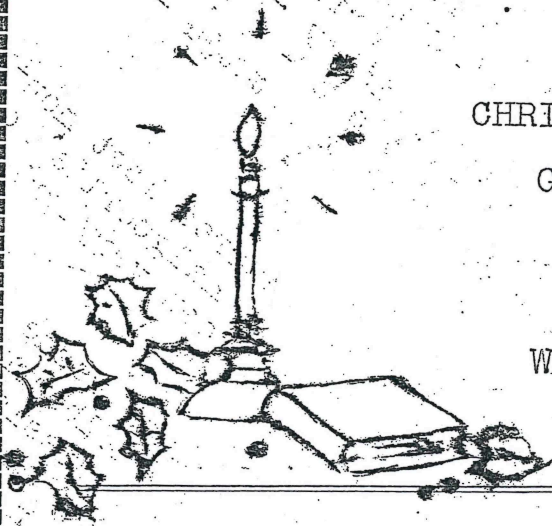

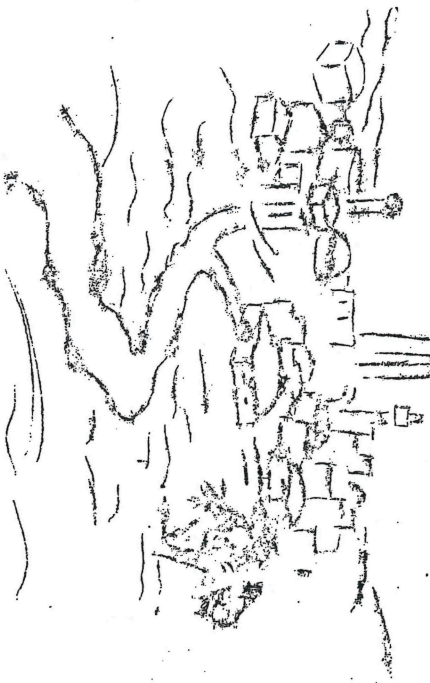
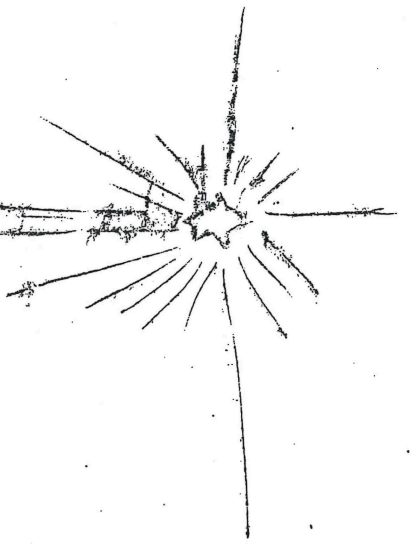

#### RADIO PROGRAMME

No doubt many of you have already heard the voices of "home" on 6KG each Saturday night at 9.30 p.m. as the "Mission Church Hour" is broadcast. But I wonder if you can picture those who take part in the Session.

The Session is recorded on a tape at the Mission then sent down to Kalgoorlie to be broadcast at the appointed time. But if you could look into Mr. & Mrs. Morgan's sitting room on a Saturday night you would see the tape recorder and gramophone on a table in the corner by the fireplace and Mr. Morgan standing by it pushing buttons and giving signals and, at the appropriate time, speaking into the microphone. Then Mrs. Morgan sits at the piano to play for Mrs. Milnes' solos, or for the choir. Those in the choir stand round another microphone which is in the middle of the room, ready to sing at just the right time. No-one is allowed to sneeze, cough or get the hiccoughs. In fact they're almost scared to breathe in case it is recorded on the tape too.

Perhaps now you will be able to picture a little of what goes on behind the scenes as the programme is on the air, which enables you to hear the familiar voices of "home" and more - to be brought into touch with the things of the Lord in the midst of the things of the world; to be encouraged on your

Christian way; and to give you some worthwhile thought to carry with you ~~thru~~ throughout the following week.

This is an opportunity to meet together in the Lord's name around the radio, and His promise of Matthew 18:20 is for you. "Where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them."

By the time this reaches you, Mr. & Mrs. Nash and family will have arrived to take over the Superintendency of the Mission.
